## Goals for this Meeting

- Promote awareness of PLSI and opportunities available for American Indians and Alaskan Natives interested in law
- Connect to Tribal Education Departments, Tribal Colleges, Tribal Universities, and other advisors and mentors to Native pre-law students

#### Demand for Native Attorneys

- More laws and regulations affect American Indians and Alaska Natives, and their lands, than any other group in the United States.
- Tribes and tribal entities need attorneys to advise on daily matters.
- More than 50 years ago, PLSI initiated a pipeline to law for American Indians and Alaska Natives and continues to develop programs and services to support Native law students.

## Special Scholarship Program in Law for American Indians

- Began in 1967 at the University of New Mexico School of Law.
- 8 week summer session
- Started with 20-30
  Indian students per class.



# Special Scholarship Program and PLSI

Designed to address barriers faced by Native students, including lack of:

- Knowledge of law school admission process
- Access to resources
- Native lawyer role models

## Pre-Law Summer Institute

 Offers an additional consideration for admission to law school for Native students.
 Celebrated 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in September 2017.



# Pre-Law Summer Institute

- Program's goal is to produce successful Indian law students
  - Rigorous academic program
  - Strong connections to law school admission personnel
  - Accurate and honest placement efforts







#### 3 substantive law classes

- Indian law class
- 2 first-year classes (rotating among contracts, torts, property, civil procedure, criminal law, constitutional law)
- Advocacy (writing class)
  - Legal memo
  - Appellate brief
  - Oral arguments before a 3 judge panel.

#### Faculty

- Law school professors from ABA accredited law schools
- Usually from schools with Native law student population
- > Many are Native
- Prepared to teach regular law class for firstyear law students
- > Written evaluations of students

#### Teaching Assistants

- > From previous year's class
- Completed first year of law school
- Provide workshops on briefing and outlining



#### Skills needed for law school

- Identifying issues
- Legal Analysis
- Briefing and Outlining
- Time management
- Test taking skills



#### Law School Connections

- Outreach to law schools for referrals to PLSI
- Work with law schools on conditional admissions
- One-on-one appointments with law school personnel during the program
- Provide law school admissions offices' contact information on our website

#### Law School Placement

- Professor provides two evaluations for each student
  - > Midterm evaluation
  - Final evaluation with (and sometimes without) a recommendation for law school
- Law Schools rely on our honest and accurate evaluations

# Pre-Law Summer Institute Funding

 Funding
 Bureau of Indian Education grants
 Law School Admission Council
 Private contributions - mostly PLSI alumni, Indian law firms, and the Federal Bar Association

# Financial considerations for students

- Commitment to the program means no employment during summer
- Ask tribes to help with funding
- Living allowance for students without tribal funding
- Responsible for finding housing but we provide a list of local sublets
- Program provides all textbooks
- Students need their own laptops

# PLSI

- Still follows the original model.
  - Intensive 2-month program
  - Based on sound legal education principles
  - Prominent law professors from around the country

Cohort of Native students and supported by a strong network of Native lawyers.





# Applying to PLSI

#### Similar to law school application

- Application form
- LSAC Academic Summary Report
- Official transcripts
- LSAT scores
- Letters of recommendation
- Personal statement
- Resume
- Proof of membership in federally recognized tribe
- Proof of law school application

# PLSI

- By the end of summer, students will have:
  - Completed 8 weeks of 3 substantive law school courses and 1 advocacy course
  - Taken mid-term and final exams
  - Written a legal memo and an appellate brief
  - Presented a moot court argument





#### PLSI's Judicial Clerkship Program

- Looking past law school graduation for opportunities
- Relationship between judicial clerkships and securing judicial positions
- ABA Judicial Clerkship Program
  - > 3-day program at ABA mid-year meeting
  - Research and writing project
  - > Q&A session with panel of judges and clerks

#### PLSI's Judicial Clerkship Program

 Past four years: clerks in NM Court of Appeals, Arizona Supreme Court, North Carolina Supreme Court, U.S. Courts of Appeals for Ninth and Tenth Circuits

 Q&A with panel of past clerks (PLSI alumni) every summer



#### PLSI's Native American Bar Passage Initiative

- Bar Review Course Reimbursement
- Attorney Coaching Program
- Examinee Cohort
  Development
- Resources for examinees
- Also available to Native Americans who did not attend PLSI



## Pre-law Outreach

- Pipeline to Law Initiative for Native Americans
- Outreach to tribal education departments and tribal colleges



# Connection to Alumni

- Integrate alumni components into the summer program
- Reunions
- CLEs highlight alumni and faculty
- Attorney coaching program
- Networking opportunities at conferences



# PLSI's Impact

- Approximately 1300 students from over 200 U.S. tribes have attended the program
- Estimated 90%
  graduation success
  rate
- Recruitment increased from one school to over a dozen

 Students have attended 60 different law schools from across the country.



# PLSI's Impact

- Assisted in the increase in number of Indian lawyers from 25 to over 2500
- Five Assistant
  Secretaries of Indian
  Affairs Department of the Interior
- First Native American Congresswomen, Deb Haaland and Sharice Davids, are PLSI alumnae.



# PLSI's Impact

- Revolutionized the inclusion of Native Americans in the legal profession
- Nationally recognized and respected
- Recipient of the prestigious 2012 ABA Council's for Racial and Ethnic Diversity in the Educational Pipeline Award

- Strongly endorsed by a wide variety of both state and private law schools nationwide
- PLSI's goal continues to focus on preparing Indian law students to do well in law school
